



As a young girl growing up in Milwaukee, she often fantasized about becoming a priest while helping clean the sanctuary of the church her family attended. Janice began her preparation for the priesthood 10 years ago with night classes at Lexington Theological Seminary. She is working to complete her doctor of ministry with Global Ministries University, based in California. She is also considering offers to minister. "I've been asked to say Mass in September at the Catholic Workers House in Washington, D.C. I will consider that," she said. "I also plan to continue my peace and justice work." She sees herself as an itinerant priest, not a parish priest. "I'm happiest as a priest on the streets," she said. "I will celebrate the Mass, I will celebrate the sacraments. But I intend to be out there on the streets being a voice for the voiceless." You, too, go with God, Janice.

Fred has begun the recovery process post-surgery and is feeling a bit better each day. Kate and Fred are expecting their first child around Aug. 8th, so the timing of this injury presents some real difficulties. Meanwhile, thankfully, our son Warren is back at work part-time, feeling about 90%. Warren and Kate's baby is due soon. To quote Anne, "We remain so very grateful for your prayers."


Tickets can be mailed, or delivered personally (if you're close to the D.C area).

Ann Kerns-Bowley, a 46 year-old resident of West Fenwick Island, DE, needs your help. Ann has spent the last 19 years dealing with a very complex gastrointestinal illness that has recently culminated in transplant surgery. During Ann's 17+-hour surgery she received a new digestive system of organs including a new stomach, duodenum, pancreas and small intestine. Only about 50 of these surgeries are performed annually worldwide. Ann's team at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center led by Dr. Kareem perform 70% of the worldwide total. The procedure is extensive and expensive. Ann's after care will extend for the remainder of her life.

Through the National Transplant Assistance Fund (NTAF), a fundraising campaign has been established to help defray uncovered expenses such as deductibles, co-payments, and prescriptions. The website is accessible at www.transplantfund.org. Donations may be made on-line via secure transaction processing. Since August 2006, Ann has not spent an entire month out of the hospital. Between surgeries, infections, and other procedures, her hospital time increased while her health continued to decline. When not hospitalized, Ann had consistent "bad days" consisting of abdominal pain and distention, dehydration and significant weight loss. All of this culminated in her multiple visceral organ transplant on February 21, 2008.

Those of us who have been with Ann throughout these last 19 years know a woman who has indomitable spirit and strength. Ann has endured all of her medical procedures and diagnoses with grace and a pragmatic "let's get on with it" attitude. Ann managed to raise a family, build a business, care for a home, and be a good friend and neighbor, all the while suffering through extreme pain. Ann's zest for life is unyielding. Her courage is an inspiration to us all. It's now our time to help her. Ann has been selfless in her generosity. Let's do the same.

Love Your Neighbor

Played poker recently? Played a while winning only one pot. Time to bow out—remembering Kenny Rogers' song, "You gotta know when to fold 'em."

Capital punishment, without sounding flippant, is a lot like "knowing when to hold 'em (incarceration) and knowing when to fold 'em" (execution). We recall recent court decisions re-affirming capital punishment not being cruel and inhuman punishment and wonder if it's the right thing to do. Probably not according to the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*. It says that the common good requires that an unjust aggressor be stopped from causing harm. And that he should be punished proportionate to the crime. (Kind of like dealing with the playground bully.) The church teaches that an aggressor be given the death penalty only if it is the only possible way of defending innocent lives from the aggressor. Even in the case of Saddam it seems he could not hurt anyone anymore from his prison cell. Probably only more harm has come from sectarian warfare, fueled by Saddam's "martyr statues" with his fellow Sunnis.

But aside from Saddam, all criminals have lives to be respected. True, all innocent lives must be defended and protected by an unjust aggressor, and justice be met and restitution be given. We do not forget the crime, but we must forgive. Jesus said, "Love your neighbors" and did not make an exception. In fact, He wanted all to put away "the eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth" mindset.

Only true "closure" will happen, if we forgive, pray for, and yes, even "Love your neighbor" enemy he may be.

Retreat 2008 . . . “Into the Woods”



NOVA's retreat will be held at Shrinemont from Friday evening through Sunday noon, September 12-14. The theme of the retreat will be using Stephen Sondheim's classic Grimm's fairy tales ideas as a metaphor for our spiritual journeys. We often find ourselves "in the woods" when trying to discern our spiritual path. We may be lost, confused or simply questioning where is God leading me now? The retreat will be facilitated by Maureen Connors, a member of NOVA long ago, who has done training and development for many organizations. You must make reservations ahead of time with Kopp Michelotti because we have to give Shrinemont a count of participants in advance. Call Kopp at 703-241-0789 or e-mail him at koppmich@yahoo.com. Leave a message with the names of all adults and children for whom you are reserving space. Please specify whether the kids are <3 or 4-12.

Shrine Mont is located 1 hour South of Winchester and approximately 2-1/2 hours from the Washington DC metro area, just beyond the Basye/Bryce Mountain ski resort. However, Friday afternoon traffic on I-66 might make it prudent to allow a little more time. To reach Shrine Mont, follow Route 66 West to I-81 South to Mt. Jackson (Exit #273). Turn left onto Rt. 703 (East), then right (South) on US 11, follow through town, turn right on Rt. #263 and follow approximately 15 miles to Orkney Springs.

Friday dinner will be served from 5:30 till 7:00 pm. The first session will begin at 7:30 pm on Friday. The retreat will end with lunch on Sunday at 12:30 pm. The mountains are gorgeous and the weather cooler than in DC. It's advisable to bring a jacket; also, insect repellent, extra towels, soap, and shampoo. Feel free to bring snacks of any kind to share during Friday and Saturday evening get-togethers, as well as games and puzzles, soft drinks, juice, wine, beer. Smoking is not allowed; pets are not allowed.

The cost for the weekend, lodging and meals, is \$175 for adults and teens, \$60 for children ages 4 to 12, free for children 3 years old and younger. NOVA doesn't want anyone to miss the retreat because of cost. 
