## Liturgy Tip

### The Power of Intention

Meaningful liturgy begins with intention, perhaps stated as a hope for the planners, the community and a larger world. Yet given the myriad details involved in NOVA liturgies, it can be tempting to just plunge right into the planning process. I believe that taking the time to prayerfully set an intention can lead to a creative experience that is both focused as well as receptive to the presence of Spirit among us.

Intentions differ from agendas. According to spiritual traditions of both East and West, the purest of intentions take root in the desire to align the individual will with the will of the Divine. Agendas, on the other hand, may emanate from the small self's need for security, esteem and control.

At the same time, details matter in the fulfillment of an intention. As always, the challenge is to attend to the trees without losing sight of the forest. Being intentional about liturgy planning can help on both fronts. The process may just begin with prayer and reflection. In the end, of course, the call is for planners and community to let go. The Spirit—she tends to surprise.



## *Recipe for a Happy New Year*

Pour love liberally into the whole, and mix with vim.

Cook thoroughly in a fervent heat.

Garnish with a few smiles and a sprig of joy; then serve with quietness, unselfishness, and cheerfulness—and a Happy New Year is a certainty.
