Chair Notes

School bells ring and Nova still had time for celebrating Eucharist in the park and at the Shrinemont retreat before returning to Kenmore at the end of September. Fittingly on Labor Day weekend Fr. Francis DiSpigno and the Mogs led us on a consideration of the environment and our place at the table with the need for gentleness and humility having a higher place than even lavish giving and the best of knowledge. The more separated we are, the less we have need of God. We saw the transition in scripture from Sinai, the place of covenant with fear of God and being distant from God, to Zion, the temple in Jerusalem, a place of joy.

The next Sunday we moved on to ask the question who can know God's mind? The message of renouncing all to follow Jesus was in our face and even more so when seeing renouncement as removing whatever from service of essential self. Fr. Joe Kenna continued his Trinitarian approach in addressing our Ambition, Aggression and Accumulation with Humility, Integrity (process over outcome) and Simplicity (achieving identity as one removes material - as happens in carving a marble statue). He and Marie Keefe offered the community a challenge in the form of \$1.00 and "may this challenge you to use this for something that makes you uncomfortable".

The retreat exceeded expectations as we reflected on the four pillars of Nova – Spirituality, Social Justice, Community Life and Liturgy

- with challenging experiential approaches for crossing our borders. We began with the Nova film and a circle of time on Friday night;
- standing in relation to when one joined Nova. The experience continued the next day with reflection on Spirituality followed by moving from the heart exercises; with literally seeing what divides/borders us in our social relations, moving on to social justice moments to remember and what might be calling us to bring peace and justice, and seeing the first draft of the Peace Covenant for Nova;
- with a circle of age – positioning oneself by age (lots of surprises) without talking and then reflecting on Nova's historical documents and video commentary from the Meles on community life. Saturday evening saw the Affirmandi – Ana, Ben, Ilse and Mali – regaling us with pictures of their cross-border adventures in El Salvador, each taking turns with the mike to describe what we were seeing — well spoken! followed by karaoke time with a bonfire out back for s'mores and s'more.

Sunday began in a more traditional format with pew-like space, Gregorian chant then Gloria invited the community to transform –

Liturgy Tip

The Lottery is Coming!

Gen Timpane will be coordinating the 2007-2008 "Liturgy Lottery" which will begin on Sunday, October 21st. Each household is asked to select two dates in the upcoming liturgical year for which you will be responsible for planning the liturgy. If you would like to plan a particular Sunday next year, call or email Gen before 10/21 and she will save that date for you. Although you will be the main "point person" for that date, everyone is encouraged to team up with other community members to complete the planning. If you have never planned a liturgy before, don't hesitate to select a date and then ask one or two others who have experience planning to help you out. You will receive the Readings for your liturgy by email from Clyde Chistofferson. The Music Liaison person for your month (see newsletter) is ready to take requests a week ahead and/or help you select the music. You can get tips and help with setting up the environment from Cathy Showalter. The Guidelines for Planning a Nova Liturgy are published on the inside covers of the Directory as well as on the website.

If you choose an Advent or Lenten liturgy, you will be working with a team of all the liturgical planners for that season. If you would like to work on Christmas or Easter liturgy, there will also be a small group formed for that special time. Since we sign up as much as a year ahead for some liturgies, it may happen as the time comes near that you cannot do the date you originally chose. If that happens, look in the newsletter for planners on the dates near to you and call and ask if they can switch with you. Let the Liturgy Coordinators: Gloria Mog and Anne Passin know of any switches. We hope everyone will be a part of creating liturgy at Nova – it is a faith and community-building

Thank you for all you do to make the world a better place.

Jenneca and I have just returned from an exceptionally good peace retreat! We heard speakers from Oil Change, Christian Peacemaker Teams and numerous intentional communities. We heard from a Vietnam military chaplain who later became a conscientious objector (was close with Zabelca who was the chaplain on the Enola Gay on Aug 6th, 1945). We saw movies about Hiroshima and about Religious complicity with Hitler. We went to the Pentagon, the DOE (about 70% of DOE budget is weapons related), Bethel, the Military Archdiocese and the White House. We had a huge purple octopus puppet at a few of these places, making an analogy about the way octopi can reach tentacles into far off places, hide themselves in their own ink and change colors when wanted. Fun and effective.

CONTACT YOUR SENATORS IN SUPPORT OF THE DREAM ACT

Senator Richard Durbin (D-IL) is planning to offer the Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors Act (DREAM Act) as an amendment to the Department of Defense (DOD) authorization bill later this week. It is important that you take five minutes to call your Senator in support of Senator Durbin's amendment.

The DREAM Act would permit students who are undocumented to qualify for permanent residency and become eligible for in-state tuition to attend a college or university. As many as 70,000 students per year would be positively impacted by this legislation.

Please call your Senator and ask him or her to SUPPORT Senator Durbin's DREAM Act amendment to S. 1547, the Department of Defense authorization bill.

Points to Make:

Students who would qualify came to the United States as children with their parents and entered illegally through no fault of their own. The United States is the only country they have really known. This is not an amnesty bill.

Since these young persons came with their undocumented parents into the country, they have no ability to adjust their status. The DREAM Act would give them this avenue.

The DREAM Act would invest in the future of talented and bright young people who will contribute to this nation for years to come. It is in the interest of our nation to invest in their future and to help them develop their talents and skills.

The DREAM Act would remove a federal bar on in-state tuition to those without legal status and would give states the option to provide the in-state tuition option to these students.

Nova Affirmandi Trip (continuation)

The last time I went to El Salvador was when I was ten, but my experience visiting it this past summer was completely different. I spent 10 days in 2004 with an exchange program from Key Elementary School, where I was in 5th grade. I stayed with an upper class family (who were very nice). But this time I saw a very different side of El Salvador and I did much more important work as well.

The four Nova Affirmandi arrived in San Salvador on Friday, July 27, and we spent maybe four days there, going off on day trips to Joyo de Cerén (an excavation of a Mayan village) and places where Archbishop Oscar Romero lived and worked. When we got to Ilobasco, the rural town where we were going to teach the camp, we spent some time learning about how the families there lived. We got to visit some farms in the area and learn how things worked on a farm. We had five days to run a summer camp for kids aged 6 through 12. When we first started working with the kids, I was really nervous, but it was kind of hard to be nervous when I was with kids who were six or seven. The older kids were pretty close in age to me, so I could talk to them pretty easily. It didn't really matter that I couldn't speak Spanish well and that my grammar was horrible. If I couldn't understand something, or I couldn't make myself understood, I went to Marie Keefe and she helped me by translating or giving a lot of ideas. I taught a little bit of everything, really. I did a lot with reading and stories, but I also did some singing and drawing as well. Getting the kids to be creative was a little hard. Since creativity doesn't really get you anywhere in life in El Salvador, the kids aren't really encouraged in school to

use their imaginations. It took a couple of days to get them to pretend.

I learned a lot in El Salvador. One of the things that I saw there was that just because the people there don't have a lot of things, they have a lot of spirit. It's almost as if because they aren't weighed down by objects, they can get in touch with God and religion in a way that your average American can't. In addition to that, I found that the people there were incredibly friendly and willing to help. When we got stuck up on the mountain in the rain, the people insisted on helping in any way they could, from trying to pull the car up the mountain to offering us their houses to stay in while we waited for a tow truck.

This trip really changed the way I looked at El Salvador and Hispanic culture in general. It made me want to continue learning Spanish and appreciate a lot more the things I have here in Arlington.

**4th Annual
Peace & Justice Commission Conference
Diocese of Arlington
Saturday, September 22, 2007**

The conference began with a concelebrated Mass. His Eminence Theodore Cardinal McCarrick wearing his mitre and carrying his shepherd's crook and the assisting priests and altar boys walked down the main aisle of St. Anthony of Padua Catholic church in Falls Church, VA in Solemn Procession. Cardinal McCarrick gave the homily on "The Many Faces of Our Human Family: A Catholic Perspective on Immigration." The Cardinal combined the issue of global warming and the possibility of its causing significant future migrations, with the need for all Catholic Christians to understand and to practice their faith by reaching out to immigrants in 2007. The Prayers of Petition section of the Mass were for me particularly moving. Here women were featured prominently. Speakers included men and women from many countries of the world who prayed for the Catholic Church in English and in their native languages, and for people who are migrants and immigrants. After Mass concluded, those attending the conference were treated to an agape in the courtyard, before assembling for a talk by Bishop Paul S. Loverde of the Diocese of Arlington, VA. Bishop Paul pointed out that his parents were immigrants from Sicily and how it is important for Catholic Christians to understand the Catholic Church's Social teaching on immigrants and immigration. After the Bishop's talk, and a welcome message from Reverend Gerry Creedon, Marcela VonVacano and Elizabeth Belmonte, two immigrants who are members

of Churches in the Arlington Diocese gave their personal testimonies about what it was like to be immigrants to this country. After a brief lunch break, conference participants chose different workshop topics. Choices of Workshop topics included: Legislative Advocacy, Federal, State and Local, Pastoral Response, Direct Services Assistance, Impact on Families and Convening of Latino Immigrants.

Report on Liturgy Planning

“Crossing the Borders” into New Liturgical Realms

At the final retreat session at Shrinemont this year, we explored, first in action and then in discussion, questions around when we feel most present, enlivened and spirit-filled in our liturgical life and ideas that bubbled up for extending, enlarging and stretching ourselves in liturgy. Many wonderful ideas were mentioned, here are a few of them:

- Creating a sacred space in which the liturgy takes place is very important. It should be free of distractions, rich with color, symbolism, natural flowers/plants. It can also be very simple, focused, calming.
- Circular chair arrangements help to include everyone and convey a communal feeling where everyone is important and contributing to the experience.
- Personal greeting of one another is very important as the community gathers for liturgy.
- A “good reading” of the readings is powerful.
- Weaving in more quiet time for internal focus, reflection, and listening to the Spirit within deepens the spiritual experience.
- Do more parts of the liturgy in Spanish.
- Have a circular altar now and again and gather around for the Eucharistic prayer so that all are part of the transformation.
- Incorporate more movement, body prayer, dance.
- More lay participation in the consecration.
- Invite everyone’s involvement, all of the community to be acknowledged.
- Have Fr. Chris come for homilies and para-liturgical events.
- Hold the liturgy at a Detention Center or other place that needs prayers and reform.
- Hold joint liturgies with other communities and/or churches.
- Continue to look for different space, particularly where everyone can hear better.
- Include more prayers and practices from other religions and cultures.
- Bring in more secular readings

At Social Justice liturgies, focus on a particular project/country/people so that we might learn more about them and pray for them in more depth.

Planners might want to consider some of these ideas. All are encouraged to think “outside the box” a little more and to share your ideas for liturgical innovations with the Liturgy Coordinators.

Hurricane Felix – “A disaster of monumental proportions”

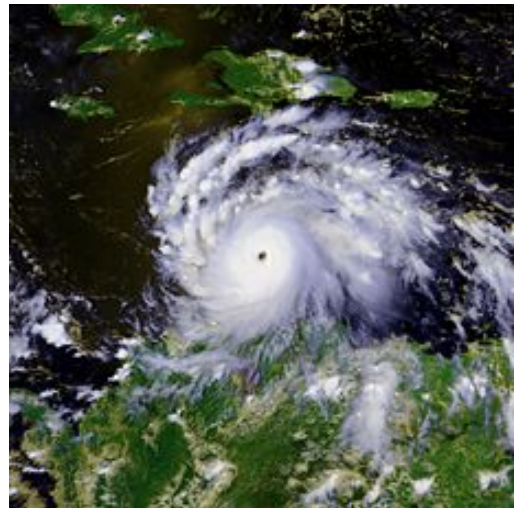
Last month, Hurricane Felix slammed into the Northern Autonomous Region of Nicaragua’s Atlantic Coast (RAAN), leaving a path of devastation in its wake. The storm left 200,000 people, many from Nicaragua’s indigenous communities, without food, water or shelter. Over 3.2 million acres of rainforest were leveled, causing incalculable damage to this biodiverse region.

The Quest for Peace immediately issued an emergency response in coordination with our partners at the Institute of Juan XXIII in Managua, who did heroic reconstruction work after Hurricane Joan in 1988 and then Hurricane Mitch in 1998. Thanks very much to all who responded.

As the full magnitude of the disaster emerges, it is clear that a major long-term recovery effort is required. Our partners at the Institute Juan XXIII tell us, *“Felix is a disaster of monumental proportions” it has impacted the most vulnerable part of Nicaragua, the very heart of poverty.*”

Between 90 and 100% of all buildings in Puerto Cabezas and Sandy Bay were destroyed, including schools and emergency shelters, leaving people exposed to rain and scorching sun. One hospital and six health centers suffered heavy damage. Virtually all of the crops were lost as well as livestock and fruit trees, leaving communities without food. Floodwaters contaminated wells and swept away latrines creating a health and sanitation crisis. Officially 132 are confirmed dead and 106 missing, however unofficial estimates are three times higher.



The Institute Juan XXIII is providing immediate relief with what they have on hand, and will coordinate a medium term response with funds that are coming in. We will continue to post regular reports on our website as recovery efforts unfold. Thank you very much for your generous response so far. The needs are immense and more support is needed. 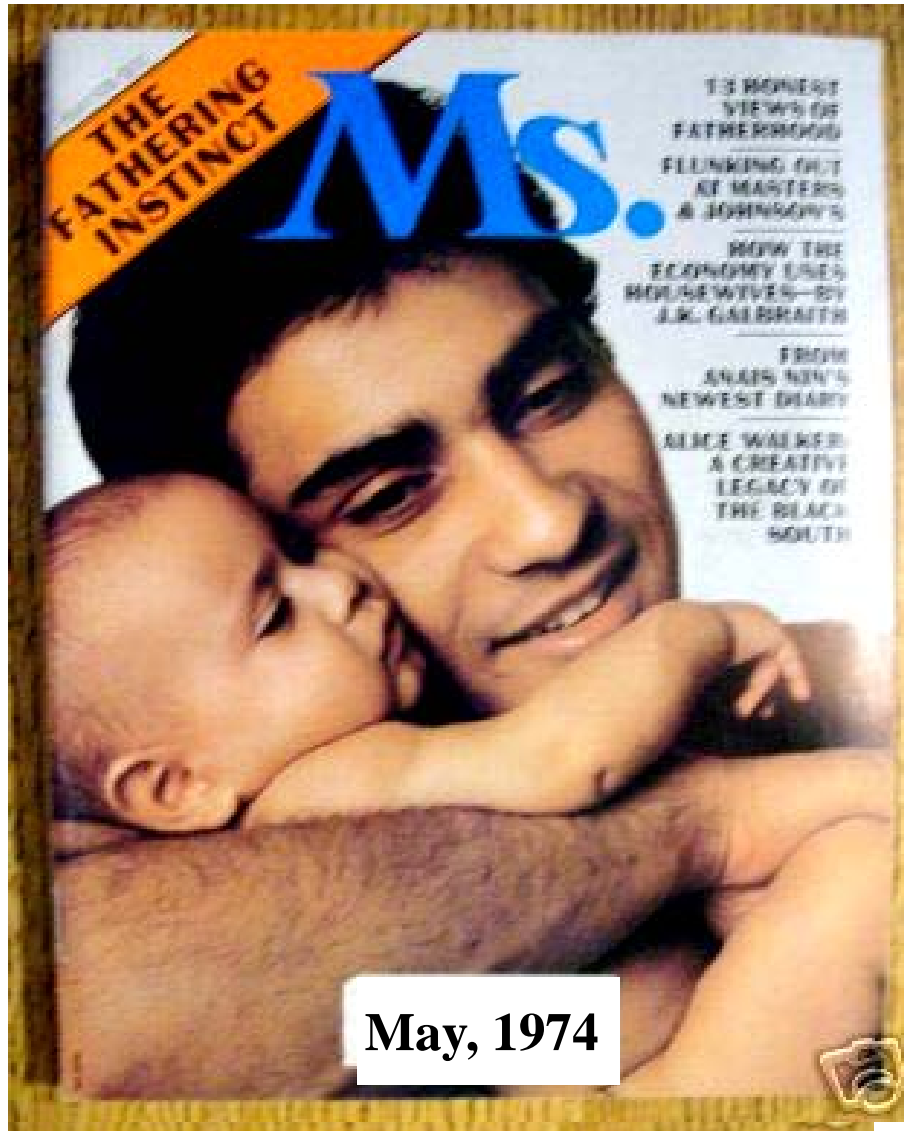
