Chair Notes

Strange as it may sound last month was a time for examining our faith. As usual we were celebrating communion in our little corner of one of creation's many cathedrals. We were blessed with cool breezes and quiet deep prayers and thoughts that have expanded our spiritual horizons and enhanced our care for those around us.

Joe Kenna started us off with faith grounded in creation. It is a faith not based on a magic show nor on a rationalistic parsing of creation but of wonder at the miracle of creation itself and all the surprises it continues to reveal, a faith that believes in what it can't see, touch, feel and hear. This faith gives rise to our beliefs and values and then our behavior. Joe believes his own personal belief is amplified by sticking together. Bill Callahan carried us further into faith with his examination of Peter's doubts as he walked across the sea. Bill described faith as our response to life events. It tells us who we are and what we stand for, even though based on doubts.

The mysticism of creation was then shared with us by John Haughey with cautions about taking it for granted. Jesus and the apostles were caught off guard by the Canaanite woman in taking for granted His mission only to the lost sheep of Israel. Even Jesus had to broaden His own horizons which led John into his conclusions about the virtue of communion. He indicated we can't find the person/Jesus apart from the experience of communion which, when it happens, leads us to the ministry of communion.

As I pondered thoughts of communion/Eucharist/community I then heard during the following Sunday Joe Nangle's words of consecration that we recognize Jesus in the breaking of the bread

together and in drinking the wine together. We come to know Jesus in that experience. After his experiences, when asked "Who do you say that I am?", Peter could rightly say "You are the Messiah..." With that Peter was entrusted with the keys to God's reign. On Peter's faith Jesus indicated He would build His community. The keys were a power, an influence. Joe ended by asking "How do we use the power given to us? It is a power to include or exclude, a power to pick up or ignore, the influence of the canary in the mine who tells us by its behavior of something we cannot smell, taste, hear or touch.

Our prayers and blessings went out to many including those going off to college for the first time, those going overseas to Turkey/Bolivia/Iraq and beyond to communion with others outside our own little community, some as an explicit Christian Peace Witness, to Anne Houck moving into Green Springs with Sonja's house blessing to bring in and keep the good spirits of the hearth, to those in need of meaningful employment, to those in need of hope in times of medical crises, to those with new grandchildren in whom we place much faith.

We are a spiritual community formed in the Vatican II Catholic tradition.

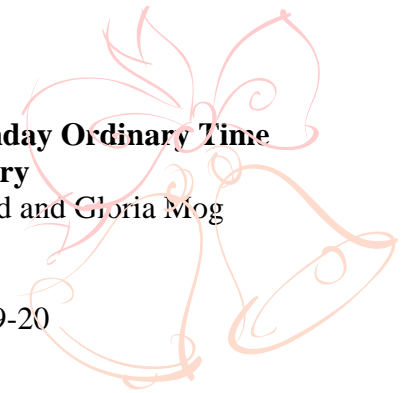

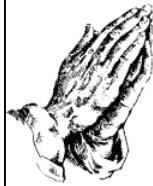

Whatever the toll is, it is in addition to our active military personnel who choose to take their own lives. 987 American troops died of non-combat causes, perhaps some of them by their own hand. Somehow our press continues to report of "suicide bombers" (mail & female)

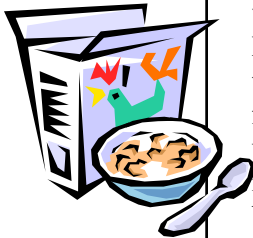

Nova's Social Justice Project to provide rental assistance for families in order to prevent homelessness/eviction

1. An Arlington family with a grandmother, daughter, and grandchild. The grandmother took time off from work to care for her daughter and grandchild after a transplant operation, therefore temporarily couldn't pay rent.
2. A family with a woman whose husband had been in an alcohol rehabilitation program and was not receiving pay during his inpatient stay. He is returning to work and was offered his old job back. This was to prevent eviction.

Homeless Prevention Family Project Update August 2008

The family is making great progress! The baby is almost 8 months and is growing and developing well. The 3 older girls will start school after Labor Day – kindergarten, 4th, 5th. In July we reduced the mother's rental subsidy to one half of her rent for the second half of the year. The mother continues to work at Legal Seafood, and at the same time is conducting a job search for a full-time job with benefits. (Reminder: she has been a prep chef and they keep her hours under 40 so she is not eligible for benefits.) Jenny Carroll continues to work with the mother on a variety of issues such as internet help for the job search, helping her get the baby signed up for Infant Head Start (she's on the list but hasn't been invited yet), encouragement and leads to take English classes that fit into her work schedule, and recently to make use of the Arlington Pediatric Clinic for the children. Jenny also spends time with the children each week, reading with them and giving them opportunities for outings. The mother has been faithfully paying off her bills with some assistance from the children's father. She works hard, lives very sensibly and is striving to eliminate debt. Jenny has received some budget advice from another Nova person.

Peace ... and just a few lines from Juba/Sudan, on this 13th day of August.

You likely have wondered a few times if I am still alive and what if anything has gone on with the proposed Catholic University of the Sudan and plans to get it underway. I returned to the Sudan on 10 June ... a few days in Khartoum and then came on to Juba ... and finally some good news -- on Thursday two weeks ago (St Ignatius Day, no less), after spending most of the day in the GoSS Education Minister's outer office, I succeeded in obtaining a document signed by the Minister approving in general the proposed programs for the Catholic University of the Sudan. With that and a subsequent document, we are licensed to engage in "official activities," in the name of the Catholic University of the Sudan.

So now we continue with plans to begin the propedeutic year in September, with first lectures on Monday 22 Sept – *se Deus quiser!*—as the attachment = promotion brochure (2 pp, landscape) indicates. And the plans are pretty well along. This first year, we will be using the

facilities of the Comboni Secondary School here in Juba – for the second year, well my hope is that the Bishops' Conference will give the go ahead to construct facilities on four or five acres of land on the NW corner of the Seminary Grounds in Juba. *Vamos ver!*

A Consortium of US Universities/Land Grant Colleges (VA Tech, Cornell U, WSU and perhaps Texas A&M and Cal-Davis) continues discussions on a collaborative program with us to establish a Faculty of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences – interesting with my ties to both Cornell (grad studies) and Washington State (undergrad)!! Some members of the Consortium (headed by VATEch) plan an exploratory visit in early October with a bit of a research component ... following what we did in Mozambique, we plan a workshop that includes representatives from the three state universities and the Ministries in Southern Sudan, to look at a wider range of issues related to Univ. training programs and research in the agricultural & environmental sciences. Groups here are positive in their response to this proposal ... so these initiatives are beginning to bear fruit ... or at least are positive.

Sudan remains much in the news ... tho perhaps this week the Olympic Games will crowd it out. There has been much 'consternation and indignation' on the part of the President of the Govt of National Unity (Bashir, a military man who comes out of the Nile River = Islamic families) and his supporters over the ICC charge that he be indicted for his crimes against the Darfur Communities. On the positive side, the fact is that he/they are concerned about this charge and as a result are beginning to take steps (at least to appear as if they are doing so) to resolve this conflict. So we will see how this develops.

Let me get this along to you. Trust you are enjoying these mid-summer days – with many comings and goings ... and at least for the younger set, anticipating/dreading the end of summer and the return to school days! Still good memories of visits your way – most recently the Palm Sunday liturgy!

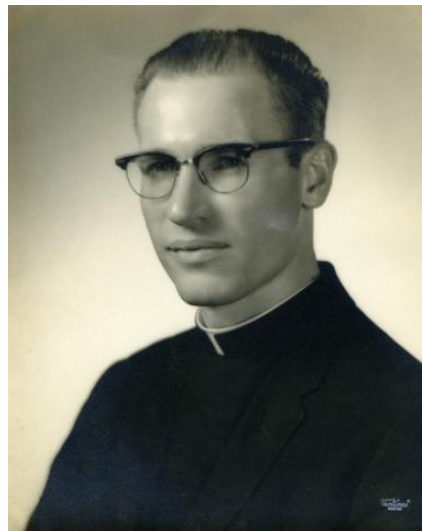

Life is full of circumstances I will never completely understand. All I can do is fight as hard as I can for the goals I want to achieve. Sometimes it is not that easy, especially when my goal of getting my Hospitality Management degree is being limited. Getting a higher education is a challenge, since I have to pay out-of-state tuition. College is already expensive, and paying almost triple is a gigantic obstacle; an obstacle that will not defeat me. Even if it takes me more than four years to finish my degree, I have faith in myself I will do it.

My family is composed of my little brother, my mother, and me. Due to economical problems I had to start working at an early age. Since I am fifteen years old I am working as a cashier because my mother, alone, doesn’t earn enough to cover all the expenses. I have always tried to save as much money as possible to invest on my education. Since I was a freshmen at high school, I knew my education was not going to stop there.

No one in my family had the opportunity to go to college. Some of them didn’t even finish high school. I am the first one in my generation enrolled in a college. I am already working seven days a week at two different places because I am trying to save money for my tuition, but it’s not enough. For the Fall Classes I wanted to be enrolled as a full-time student, but I don’t have enough money. I can’t work more hours because I have to go to school and I can’t go to school because I don’t earn enough. It’s like a circle where both are essential in my life. Working at two places at the same time and being a full-time student hasn’t been easy in the previous semesters, but I got A’s and B’s in all my classes. My current GPA at Northern Virginia Community College is 3.25, which is a decent GPA having in mind all the hours I am working per week. All I want is to continue going to school; I want to keep making the difference among my family. Education is the key to open the door of success. My high school diploma is not enough; I want to keep learning; I want to get a higher education. My economic situation will not limit my academic abilities; I will not let it defeat me.

from Nonviolent Peaceforce



I am pleased to send you the current annual report of the Nonviolent Peaceforce, "Impact 2007".

[See <http://nonviolentpeaceforce.org/files/AR2007.pdf>.] This comprehensive document will provide you with our work as an international nongovernmental organization providing an unarmed protective force of trained civilians from around the world. Our vision is to create a large-scale nonviolent peace force supporting and protecting local civil society in conflict areas through the development of field projects and additional models for deployment, public education, training and advocacy.

The Nonviolent Peaceforce has active peacekeepers in the Philippines and in Sri Lanka. The need for our presence in those two areas is critical. In January 2008, we completed our protective accompaniment in Guatemala and have made the transition of the work to local human rights organizations. We are in collaboration with other organizations on providing peacekeepers on the Ecuador and Columbian border. We are in the exploratory stage of sending peacekeepers to southern Sudan to oversee the 2009 election process. The requests for our presence far outpace our financial ability to meet the needs.

We are pleased to report that the Nonviolent Peaceforce was granted Special Consultative Status with the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) of the United Nations. This designation is a testament to the quality of the people working worldwide on our vision and the hard work and expertise that several of our colleagues have applied over the past several years to make this occur. In June 2008, the Nonviolent Peaceforce made a presentation to UN member states – including some of the Security Council and the Peacebuilding Commission – on the political, economic and social impact of unarmed peacekeeping.

Did you know?

Violence is not merely killing another.

It is violence when we use a sharp word,
